

Bond Falls – near U.S Hwy 45 in Paulding. The falls are created as the middle branch of the Ontonagon River tumbles over a thick belt of fractured rock, dividing it into numerous small cascades. The total drop of the falls is about 50 feet. There is a short boardwalk to and from the falls and a picnic area atop the falls.

Porcupine Mountain Wilderness State Park – known as "the Porkies" features 60,000 acres of old-growth forest, roaring waterfalls, Lake Superior shoreline, rivers, trails and ridges. Its incomparable vistas make Michigan's largest state park a popular destination for camping, hiking, snowmobiling, fishing and more. The park has many popular natural attractions, including the scenic **Presque Isle River corridor** and Lake of the Clouds. Other attractions include the Summit Peak observation tower, Porcupine Mt Winter Sport Complex, fall chairlift rides, an 18-hole disc golf course, Summer Music Festival and more.

Lake Superior - borders Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan's U.P. and Ontario, Canada.

It is the largest fresh-water lake in the world. It's a paradise for fishing and known for some of the most magnificent waterfalls in the state. It has many attractions, from canoeing to exploring caves, or you can lay on many different beaches and feel like you are at the ocean with large rocks, agate and Petoskey stones and driftwood to search for and find.

Lake Gogebic – Michigan Upper Peninsula largest natural inland lake, set in the heart of the Ottawa National Forest, just minutes from the Wisconsin border. It's an ideal vacation gem from which to explore the western U.P. and many points of interest nearby. It straddles Marenisco in Gogebic County in the central time zone on the south end, and Bergland in Ontonagon County in the eastern time zone on the north end.

Copper Peak – near Ironwood, keeping watch over 2500 square miles, 3 states and beautiful Lake Superior for more than 40 years and has hosted 10 ski flying events between 1970-1994. The best is yet to come. Copper Peak will soon be the world's largest ski jump hill designated by the International Ski Federation. Copper Peak's Adventure Ride draws in thousands of visitors each year taking the chairlift up the landing and the elevator up the tower and walk the final 8 stories to take in the 26-story view. Others mountain bike on the single-track trails that wind through the surrounding hills. Others come to take pictures of fall colors, enjoy the birds and wildlife or just relax!

Brockway Mountain Drive – One of the most scenic roads in the Keweenaw. The 9 ½ mile drive has breathtaking views of Lake Superior and thousands of acres of the Keweenaw, taking you to the highest point above sea level between Copper Harbor and Eagle Harbor. There are numerous pull-offs for photos and preserves to see along the way. As your journey gets steeper, you get even better views from the top of Brockway Mountain. It is designated as an official Michigan Wildlife Viewing Area. The biggest wildlife attraction here is the annual migration of birds-of-prey from mid-April to mid-June.

HIKING TRAILS

MOUNTAIN BIKING/FAT TIRE BIKING

Copper Peak Trails highlight elevation change from the banks of the Black River, around the ski-jump base, with the last 2 miles being a fun downhill section. The area's newest trail, the Split Rock Trail, is located east of Wakefield and the Heritage Park trail in Ironwood. The Keween-

aw offers more than 37 miles of singletrack amid miles of untamed forestland dotted with unique geological features overlooking Lake Superior. Biking experts from across the globe come to Copper Harbor to get tested by



these gnarly, highly technical trails! There are other singletrack trails that are perfect for all-skill levels with varied terrain and great scenery! Or ride the hand-built technical trails among the mine ruins at Adventure Mine.

Ride hundreds of miles of scenic trails of the Western UP. Old growth forests, spectacular fall colors and pristine waters, are all part of your trail adventure in the Western UP. We also offer ATV rent-

Something For Everyone

The WESTERN UPPER PENINSULA has a rich and fascinating history. Its' vast resources of iron ore, copper, and its' connection with the Great Lakes water system make it one of the world's premiere landmarks. It is a region of land at the northern most part of the United States covering an area of over 40,000 square miles where historic and cultural sites are scattered throughout the natural geographic features of the landscape. But together they become one of the most significant historical accounts of natural and cultural history in the world.


Alligator Eye

On M-64 about two miles south of Lake Gogebic State Park Campground and about 6 miles north of U.S. 2 with just a paved shoulder of the road for parking. Take a mildly challenging ½ mile hike to the crest of this scenic rock outcrop, rising about 300 feet above the lake, and you will be at the eye of the Alligator overlooking the southwest corner of Lake Gogebic. Folklore has it that before the forests grew, when viewed from the lake; the area appeared to resemble the shape of an alligator.

Before the trail to the overlook was improved, a small-scale archaeological excavation was conducted by Ottawa National Forest. They found a large amount

of quartz material embedded in the rock outcrops and determined the site was probably a quarry from which quantities of quartz were chipped from the surrounding bluffs many years ago and may have been used for a variety of tasks such as hunting, skinning game, cutting, gathering and scraping plant material. When you reach the "eye" you may also be lucky enough to find Indian Artifacts which the area was known for.

From the Lake Gogebic east shoreline, viewing the west shore landscape, it appears to be an alligator outline. The high spot where the Alligator Eye Overlook is located looks like where the alligator's eye would be. How an alligator could be in da U.P. only the Yoopers know!??

At roughly 60,000 acres, the Porcupine Mt. Wilderness State Park is Michigan's largest state park and one of the few remaining large wilderness areas in the Midwest. Recently, the "Porkies" have been recognized as the "most beautiful state park in the nation" by a travel website.



Its home to a 35,000 acre old-growth forest, roaring waterfalls, miles of rivers and streams, more than 90 miles of hiking trails, modern and rustic campgrounds, back-country camping, Lake Superior shoreline and unrivaled vistas.

The park boasts many popular natural attractions, including Lake of the Clouds (with an accessible viewing area), the scenic Presque Isle corridor. Other attractions include the Summit Peak observation tower, Porcupine Mountains Ski Area, an 18-hole disc golf course and much more.

The popular Porkies Visitor Center offers interpretive programs, an exhibit hall, information on trail conditions, Wi-Fi, a gift shop and more.

Nonesuch Falls Trail in the Porkies

When you are ready for a "creepy' hike through the ruins of an abandoned mining town, combining history and a dash of eeriness, we've got the perfect destination. If you are an avid outdoor explorer, intrigued by ghost towns, or just like learning more about the history of our state, take a hiking trip to the Nonesuch Falls Trail, which visitors consider a haunted trail. The trail can be reached via South Boundary Road off M-107, within the Porcupine Mountains Wilderness State



Park. The trail is also accessible for mountain biking and cross-country skiing.

Michigan's Iron Belle Trail

Jump on the longest designated state trail in the nation as you hike or bike your way between Belle Isle Park in Detroit and Ironwood in the Upper Peninsula. Explore pristine forests, pass cool rivers and visit charming towns, and find out why Michigan is known as "The Trails State." The 1,273-mile hiking route (69% complete) incorporates a large portion of the existing North Country National Scenic Trail. It traverses the west side of the Lower Peninsula and borders Lake Superior in the Upper Peninsula. The 791-mile bicycle route utilizes existing multi-use trails and follows US-2, a designated national bicycling route in the Upper Peninsula. Excellent handicapped access from Besssemer to Ironwood. Discover the Heritage

Trail System in Ironwood The Miners Memorial Heritage Park encompasses the former iron ore mining locations within the City of Ironwood (locally known as the caves area). The discovery of these mines resulted in the establishment of the City of Ironwood in the latter part of the 19th century.



The last iron ore mine in the City of Ironwood closed in 1966. Take trails for hiking cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, and mountain biking. The trail winds thru the area for about 15 miles.

The trail winds thru the rustic area for two and a half miles.

Each summer, attend the Art in Miner's Park exhibit to see pieces by local artists.

The Paulding Mystery Light

The light appears in a valley outside of Paulding, about four miles north of Watersmeet, off US 45 on Robbins Pond Road/Old US 2. The road is about a half mile long, lined with woods and ends a guard rail where there is a ravine and then a large hill.

The mysterious light has defied explanation since it was first sighted about 60 years ago. It can be

observed almost every night once darkness has descended. A noticeable white light rises slowly out of the forest and hovers low in the sky for ten minutes to over a quarter of an hour. For some reason there is a red light hovering near the light as well, similar to an infra-red beam. The white light moves at times, swinging or almost appearing as if someone was running down a hill with a lantern at a fast pace. It's amazing, although a little scary!

Some have said that while looking at the light through binoculars, they have seen what appears to be a dark figure walking across the road.

There are folklore stories related to the mystery light. The most popular legend involves the death of a railroad brakeman. It states that the valley once contained railroad tracks and the light is the lantern of the brakeman who was killed while attempting to stop an oncoming train from colliding with railway cars stopped on the tracks. Another story claims the light is the ghost of a slain



mail courier. There are a couple of other legends as well.

There have been some scientific investigations. The hypothesis is that the stability of an inversion layer allows vehicle lights to be visible from the stretch of highway 4.5 miles away.

In the meantime, THE MYSTERY LIGHT continues to baffle, intrigue and mystify people!

Sylvania Wilderness

Few Wilderness areas compare to Sylvania with its old growth forest and pristine lakes. Leave your motors and wheels behind and enjoy the solitude of this fantastic 19,000-acre wilderness area. Here you will find 34 named lakes – some with sandy beaches, others surrounded by record-sized pines. Many of the lakes are connected by portages, and campsites have been established. Spend the afternoon exploring Sylvania and you might just see a rare orchid, a bald eagles, loons and osprey. This wilderness area offers canoe and kayak camping, 30 miles of hiking trails. Trails are well suited for both day hiking and backpacking trips. Car camping is also available in the beautiful forest at Clark Lake.

The Cisco Chain of Lakes is a spectacular destination for fishing, boating and other outdoor activities. The famous chain is made up of 15 lakes with over 270 miles of scenic shoreline. Nestled in colorful forests with abounding wildlife, the Cisco chain is one of the largest chain of lakes in the world. These pristine lakes are dotted with many islands for picnicking and exploring.

As for fishing, the spring-fed waters offer excellent fishing for Walleye, Northern Pike, Muskies, Bass and Panfish. Notably, the current state record Muskie was caught in Thousand Island Lake in 1980. www.watersmeet.org



THE ARTS

Historic Ironwood Theatre

Ironwood has kept many historical buildings, each worthy of a visit. The Ironwood Theatre in downtown was built as a vaudeville and silent movie palace in 1928. It was placed on the National Registry of Historic Places in 1985. Today a non-profit organization operates the theatre and hosts numerous shows per year.

Some unique renovations include the ceiling Proscenium Mural and wall and beam decorations as well as the "Grand Old Lady", the Barton Organ.

It's one of only 6 remaining operable original installations, completely intact as it was on opening night, June 1928, and is regularly used for concert performances.

Theatre North features performances by the theatre in-house group and also sponsors children's theatre workshops & productions. It is included in: Historical Downtown Walking Tour.

The 1st tour (self-guided) of the commercial district highlights 12 sites, starting with the original Ironwood Historical Society building on McLeod Ave. and visiting Theatre North, the 1925 Sears Roebuck building, and the 1892 Railroad Depot, ending at the Carnegie Library, built in 1901.

The 2nd tour of the residential district begins at the 1921 Memorial Building and includes stops at the 1895 Curry House and the 1925-built L.L. Wright High School and ends at the 1886 Church of the Transfiguration.

Ontonagon Theatre of Performing Arts

In the early 1920's the Ontonagon Twp Memorial Building was built. The second floor was turned into the theatre.

The theater was used until the early 1950's, then it fell into disrepair. In 1997, the citizens of Ontonagon decided they needed a proper theater and restoration efforts began.

The theater offers cultural, interactive & educational experiences for all age groups, and it restored a sense of community for the people of the Ontonagon area.

Located in downtown Ontonagon, thismay be one of the best small-town museums you'll ever see. There are thousands of fascinating artifacts that speak volumes of the shipping, mining and logging eras, all local history displays with photographs, reading room, genealogy research and gift shop. Housed here is a replica of the Ontonagon Boulder, a 3,708 pound copper mass that sparked a copper rush in the Upper Peninsulain the mid 1800s. The original boulder is at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington D.C.

The museum building was completed in 1887, serving as the first doctor's home, office and hospital. The dangers of living in this early northern frontier provided daily excitement for the tiny clinic, not always with a happy ending.

Many believe that the spirits of some of those who passed there still reside in the 135 year-old building!

Ice Fishing U.P. of Michigan's premiere fishing lake, Lake Gogebic!

Lake Gogebic:

The Lake Gogebic area is a winter wonderland for all types of activities. Skiing, Snowmobiling, Ice Fishing, just to name a few. The Timbers Resort basically focuses on Snowmobiling and Ice Fishing during this time.

Lake Gogebic is the largest lake in the U.P. stretching nearly 14 miles long and 3 miles wide, at its widest point approximately 14,000 acres.

We average over 200" of snow annually. So, with that being said, you really need to be prepared when you come to Lake Gogebic for ice fishing. What I mean by that is the best way to get around on the lake is with a long track snowmobile and a portable ice shelter always being mobile and searching. Speaking from experience I have to say that Lake Gogebic is one of the most brutal lakes to be on during the winter months. That is because of all the snow that we get up here. The snow creates a lot of slush pockets on the lake. The lake is constantly changing and is why I say a long track snowmobile is the preferred method of travel. 4 wheelers may work in the beginning of the season some years but as winter starts to settle in, chances are you won't be able to use a 4-wheeler after the first couple of weeks of the ice fishing season.

Now that you have some tips on being prepared. Lake Gogebic is an awesome lake to ice fish. The information that I have mentioned above makes Ice Fishing on Lake Gogebic interesting and fun.

As we get into the late season of ice fishing a lot of our visitors are here to target the perch, in search of that fish of a lifetime. Yes, the lake

can offer the largest perch of your life pushing upward of 2lbs +.

During the late season we are typically targeting the main part of the lake for the Perch. We will begin searching on the East and West shorelines where the steep breaks transition into the mud flats. This is where the wigglers live and that is what the Perch are feeding on. The best presentation for these jumbo perch is a dead stick presentation using wigglers.

The walleye bite continues in the shallow weeds on the north end of the lake throughout the year with most anglers using tip ups tipped with sucker minnows in that 3 - 4" range. The walleye bite is typically a low light bite with the bite being in the early mornings and evenings. In the mornings I like to get out there a few hours before day-break and in the afternoons I will get set up a couple hours before sunset and fish for a few hours after dark.

Always remember to practice catch and release. We want you to come here and enjoy our beautiful area, so it is very important to protect the resource which we are taking from. One of the most important things to do while you are fishing for these jumbo perch in deep water is to bring them up slow so they don't blow their air bag and they can be released successfully.

Keep in mind that the walleye fishing closes on March 15. Currently, we have legislation in place that lets you harvest 5 walleye's, 15" or larger. Perch harvest is 25 with no more than 5 over 12". Northern Pike has no minimum size limit, and you can now keep 5 with only 1 greater than 24". Always make sure you know the regulations before you



head out.

I do not personally guide on the ice anymore, I leave it to the young guys. The Timbers Resort works with a guide who is an established Ice Fishing Guide, and his main focus in the winter is the Perch. He promotes catch & release, select harvest protecting the large females. These large females have very little meat on them but are full of eggs. It is very important that we put these fish back as much as possible. He also does some guiding in the winter for Walleye's but mainly Perch.

The Timbers Resort offers 11 different housekeeping cabins all varying in size located on the north end of Lake Gogebic. We also offer ice fishing snowmobile rentals. We have a Live Bait and Tackle store on site. We spend time with our customers going over the Lake Map pointing them in the right directions to get on fish. We look forward to seeing you!

The Western Upper Peninsula seems to be experiencing an upswing in grouse numbers after what seemed like several years of somewhat dismal hunting. Sightings and shot opportunities steadily increased as we got into the month of October with the leaves finally falling.

I used to get out a lot more when I was a bit younger. I spent many hours brushing and signing the many miles of our snowmobile trail system and exploring the logging roads and trails by ATV and pickup. This gave me a first-hand idea of how strong the grouse population was in our area.

Nowadays, I find my time is taken up with bear and deer hunting as well as all the fall chores that being a resort owner requires of me. I now mainly rely on customer reports to gage grouse numbers.

There are some grouse habitat project areas that many hunters flock to.

Most of the guys I talk to at the resort like to stay away from these areas and get further off the beaten path to find undisturbed and less

pressured birds. For the past several years logging has been hot and heavy in our area, which is giving us better habitat. It doesn't look too pretty for a year or two but the long-term benefits for deer and grouse is promising. The grouse hunting customers I had this year were pleasantly impressed with the number of birds they saw. What they weren't too impressed with was their shooting ability.

Our grouse season begins mid-September and runs to mid-November and closes during the deer rifle season. It kicks back in for the month of December. The MDNR provides resources and guidelines to help hunters with their trip. There are also a few area guides and outfitters to help ensure a successful and enjoyable hunt.

I think we are looking at the next few years of grouse hunting improving for the Western U.P. If you happen to plan a trip to our area or lake, don't forget that fishing can get pretty good off the shoreline at night at this time of the year. Pack your fishing gear and enjoy some double duty outdoor activity!

GROUSE IN RHINE WINE

2 grouse
1/2 cup minced
fresh mushrooms
Dash of salt
1 Tablespoon parsley
Flour
4 Tablespoon butter
1/2 cup minced onion
1/2 cup Rhine wine
1/2 cup heavy cream

Rub meat with salt & flour. Melt butter in skillet, lightly saute' birds. Place birds in crock pot. Saute' the onion, mushrooms and parsley in skillet, add wine, then pour over birds. Slow cook about 4-5 hours. Add the heavy cream and heat thoroughly. Serve over rice.

Ottawa National Forest

The million-acre Ottawa National Forest in the Western U.P. extends from the south shore of Lake Superior to the Wisconsin border. It's rich in wildlife, rolling hills dotted with lakes, rivers and waterfalls, and spectacular fall colors.

The ONF provides a variety of canoeing, kayaking, and boating, along with warm and cold-water fishing opportunities. It encompasses over 500 lakes, 2000 miles of wild and scenic rivers, and access to Lake Superior.

More than 196 miles of hiking and backpacking trails offer something for everyone. Some provide short, easy walks to points of interest, such as waterfalls and historic sites. Cross-country travel is also another challenging opportunity offered.

The ONF is also known as waterfall country! Trails mark the way too many of the waterfalls and visited all year long!

The ONF provides a variety of camping opportunities, including campground camping, wilderness camping and dispersed camping. All are accessible by road and most service both tent and campers. They are located near lakes or rivers and offer some fishing opportunities.

The ONF works closely with our partners and volunteers to offer a variety of cross-country skiing on groomed trails. Whether you are an expert skier, or a beginner, you'll enjoy the great outdoors all winter long.

The ONF has over 2,300 miles of Forest Service roads and trails open to off-highway vehicles (OHV's).

Free Motor Vehicle Use Maps (MVUM's) are available to show what routes are open to OHV's and what routes are open to highway legal vehicles, and routes open to all vehicles. Maps are available at our offices and on the Forest website.

There are over 450 miles of groomed snowmobile trails. These trails are maintained through a cooperative effort between the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, numerous local snowmobile clubs, and USDA Forest Service.

The ONF offers a winter wonderland for snowshoe enthusiasts. There are no designated trails, but

with a compass and map a person can go virtually anywhere on the Forest.

Ottawa Visitor's Center in Watersmeet


Located at junction US Hwy-2 & US Hwy-45

Here you will find recreation information, maps, and much more. It's packed with interpretive exhibits and animal mounts explaining the Forest's natural and cultural history, and educational videos to be viewed in the auditorium. Thursday evening programs are held during the summer months. Topics may include wildlife, photography, history, weather, and forest management.

The Visitors Center and interpretive trail are fully accessible. No charge for admission, or to attend the interpretive programs on Thursdays.

Also located in the Visitor's Center is the BEAR'S DEN, offering many environmental books, Ottawa apparel, unique gifts and other nature-related items to purchase. Proceeds, after expenses, go back to the Ottawa in the form of grants for interpretive projects in the Ottawa.

THE SECRET BEHIND JEOPARDY! How a Yooper created the greatest game show

Editor's note: This article first appeared in Marquette Monthly. The author is a former Ontonagon County resident who had a long career with Copper Range, at the old White Pine Mine.

At the end of every televised Jeopardy! game show, the last credit reads "Created by Merv Griffin."

He did create the popular Wheel Of Fortune program, had his own TV talk show for 21 years, and was an entertainment legend, but he DID NOT create Jeopardy! A Yooper did, and Griffin admitted it.

The creator is Julann Wright of Ironwood, who was married to Merv Griffin for 17 years.

Griffin revealed the true story in an interview, Julann repeated it in another interview, and she repeated the straight scoop when we traced her to the Shenandoah Valley of Virginia, where she lives now on an old plantation. "Don't let the 'plantation' word fool you," she cautioned. "It sounds more elegant than it is!"

Our far-ranging talk was full of wonderful memories and the swapping Ironwood stories with a lively and very funny show-business veteran from the U.P.

Julann recalled that in 1963 she and Merv were flying from Duluth to New York after visiting her parents in Ironwood. He was shuffling notes and clippings, looking for a show idea.

"What, another game show?" she asked, and he said, "Yeah."

She said she was tired of game shows "with people jumping around and doing pantomimes and acting like fools. What happened to knowledge-based games?"

At that time, TV executives were leery of game shows because of recent scandals in which contestants were given the answers in advance and told to feign anguish and indecision before spouting the winning answer.

Mindful of this, Julann countered with, "Why don't you give them the answers and make people come up with the questions?"

When Merv asked for an example, Julann replied with, "The answer is 5,280" and Merv responded with the question: "How many feet in a mile?"

A Legend is Born

"We kept going and I kept throwing him answers and he kept coming up with questions," Julann recalled. "And by the time we landed the plane, we had an idea for a show.

"Well, after that he went right down to his office, got the guys working on it, building some sets, which I helped him build, and then they had meetings at our house, playing practice games. "When we first went to NBC with the idea, they said it was too difficult, so we had to dumb it down a little so the big men at NBC could play it!" Merv's version of events had them taking the idea to NBC which "bought it without even looking at a pilot show."

It first aired in early 1964 with Julann's sisters Sally and Maureen on the original writing staff.

Julann said that President Richard Nixon was a faithful viewer, always scheduling his lunch hour so he could watch the show. Singer Frank Sinatra was another big fan.

A syndicated version began in 1984 with the beloved Alex Trebek hosting until his recent death. Two different versions, with different hosts, play now on U.P. TV stations. Jeopardy! has been voted one of the best TV shows in American history, born out of the creative mind of a memorable U.P. woman.

Julann recalled that the first big winner was a Black cab driver from Chicago with a long winning streak "because he knew a lot of trivia. He beat a lot of professors and everybody else."

She's still a fan and watches whenever she can.

"But I feel like it's my baby that went to school and graduated and then went overseas," she told an interviewer. "It's not even connected to me anymore. Jeopardy! belongs to all of us now.

"I think the reason it quickly grew was that it was real and not fake. It's about the information and not gimmicks. I'm shocked that it's still on today. Those first days were a miraculous time."

Merv Griffin sold the rights to the show for \$250 million, and made millions more from his Wheel of Fortune program — especially the show's theme song, which brought in more millions.

When he died in 2007, his wealth was estimated at \$1.6 billion, according to internet sources.

There was a lot more to Julann Wright than that show's creation. She was a force in her own right.

After graduating from high school and college in Ironwood, she headed for New York and a career in show business. She played the comic foil on the Robert Q. Lewis TV show for years, drawing laughs through her feigned stupidity.

It was on the Lewis show that she met Merv Griffin, whom she eventually married and moved to California. Another career as a movie actress gave her parts in films like Haunted Honeymoon and The Woman in Red. Big Mistake

After her 17-year marriage ended, Julann faced a glass ceiling in being denied a credit card in her own name. Sorry, the bank said, not for women.

Well, they had just poked a bee's nest!

Out of the same creative brain which invented Jeopardy came another breakthrough: The First Women's Bank of California, created by persuading eight other women to help her form the bank whose mission was to help women save money and establish credit.

The first customer through the door was none other than Florence Henderson, star of the wildly popular Brady Bunch TV show. Then came actresses Jane Fonda, Phyllis Diller, Anne Bancroft, Farah Fawcett, Loretta Swit of MASH, and a parade of the famous and unfamous who bought into Julann's creation by buying stock and opening accounts.

In 1978, Julann was honored with an invitation from Gogebic Community College in Ironwood, her alma mater, to address the graduates at commencement, in a speech entitled "You Are What You Think."

Her status as a banking executive, radio star, and TV creator and producer also earned her an honorary degree.

"I graduated from there," she told us, "but was not a good student. My interests were elsewhere so it was really something when they asked me to give the commencement speech!"

She loved Ironwood and its great people, a wonderful place to grow up. The family home was at 223 West Aurora, and her father, Robert, was a local judge.

"My favorite store in Ironwood was my uncles' Gil and Joe Trier's drug store on Suffolk Street. I was a soda jerk there. When my friends came in my uncles would warn me not to tell them how big my pay was, but I told them not to worry, I was ashamed about how little I was paid," she said..

Even though she lived in ski country, she was never a skier "but I would go down Mount Zion sitting in a box!"

She lives not far from Thomas Jefferson's home and the University of Virginia. "I raise a lot of my own vegetables. It's a lot like the U.P. here, without the snow."

"I miss the U.P. and think about it a lot," she said. "We were able to make many trips home because Merv was very good about visiting his relatives and my family. I wish I could do that now."

Author's note: The information in this article came chiefly from interviews of Merv and Julann by other writers, and from a wonderful phone conversation I had with her. She has total recall, a great sense of humor, and no bitterness at the lack of royalties from Jeopardy!

Julann Wright Griffin truly earns the title of memorable U.P. woman. How cool it would have been if the give-and-take leading to the creation of Jeopardy! had occurred as their flight passed over the U.P.

Some of the projects we are involved in are:

LAKE LEVAL – monitoring lake levels to ensure proper lake levels are maintained per FERC license.

FISHERY ENHANCEMENT – build and maintain positive relations with the DNR and other fisheries proponents. We keep a close watch on legislation that impacts our lake and water.

FISH CRIBS – applying for permits from Michigan Department of Conservation to build and place fish cribs in lake.

BOAT WASHING STATION - Currently both boat washing facilities are operated by the Watersmeet Tribe at the south end of the lake.

INVASIVE SPECIES – watch for new invasive, Phragrite, a tall reed like plant that has migrated from Australia. And the purple loose-strife is beginning to appear around the lake. TO PREVENT THE SPRED OF AQUATIC INVASIVE SPECIES, BOATERS SHOULD:

- 1. CLEAN boat, trail and equipment.
- 2. DRAIN live wells, bilges and all water-pull drain plugs.
- 3. DRY boat and equipment.
- 4. DISPOSE of unwanted bait in the trash.

MEMBERSHIP - Everyone who is interested in the wellbeing of this Lake qualifies for membership. You needn't be a property owner or a full-time resident on the Lake. Some of us are part-time residents; and others are seasonal or occasional visitors. Some of us have been on this precious body of water for generations; and others are more recent--and still learning how to pronounce 'Gogebic'. But what we all have in common is care for the Lake. So, if becoming a member is just too tempting for you to pass up, you've got two questions: How do I become a member? And how much does it cost? Membership for one year is \$15. But the better choice is a three-year membership for \$40. small parking area near the bridge that crosses the river. The main trail is on the north side of the river, but you can hike down either side.

Latitude: 46.429405 Longitude: 089.681566

Ajibikoka Falls – This waterfall is about 40 feet high and the hike is of moderate difficulty. Advanced orienteering skills are required to locate this secluded gem. It is not particularly difficult terrain, but you should have a good pair of hiking boots, bug spray, a map, and a compass. Check out the unusual quartz outcroppings around the falls.

<u>From Watersmeet, MI</u> - Take County Road 206 west to Forest Road 5120. Then park your car off the road. Follow Forest Road 5120 along the west side of Brush Lake for about a 1/2-mile. Then take a compass reading and hike northeast.

Kakabika Falls – The falls are a series of "S" turns that descend as the river drops in elevation. The trail is not long and not very difficult. There are some choice berry picking locations and nice fishing holes along the trail.

From Watersmeet, MI - Travel west on US 2 approximately 15 miles to County Road 527. Turn right (north) onto County Road 527 and travel approximately 1/2-mile to the parking area for the falls. *Latitude:* 46.336666 Longitude: -89.453005

Cascade Falls – Grab your camera because the word 'cascade' is the perfect description for this waterfall. There are two trails that lead to the falls. The main trail is the easiest, with only moderate changes in elevation. The second trail, Bluff Trail, leaves and rejoins the main trail, but is quite challenging; however the view is definitely worth the extra effort.

<u>From Bergland, MI</u> – Head east on M-28, turn north on Forest Road 400. Follow the signs to the parking area at the trailhead.

Presque Isle Falls - Although not

part of the Ottawa National Forest, we recommend a visit to this beautiful series of waterfalls. There are several falls on the Presque Isle River; those most visited are within the Porcupine Mountains Wilderness State Park.

A Recreation Passport is required for areas within Porcupine Mountains Wilderness State Park, please call 906-885-5275 for additional information.

From Wakefield, MI - Take Highway M-28 to County Road 519. Follow County Road 519 north. When you come to South Boundary Road keep going straight. (This will lead to a parking area.) Take your time and enjoy the view. Manabezho Falls is near where the mouth of the river empties into Lake Superior.

Gabbro (Bakers) Falls – Black River. Walk the line west to river and go upstream for upper and down for lower falls. Upper falls: Fairly easy access. Lower falls: Fairly easy access. Beautiful.

Take US-2 between Bessemer & Wakefield to Blackjack Road. Turn north and go past the second gas line clearing and park (1.5mile).

Black River Falls – There are five distinct and picturesque waterfalls within the Black River Harbor Recreation Area. All can be accessed by traveling County Road 513 or by hiking the North Country National Scenic Trail from the Black River Harbor parking lot. Observation platforms and a boardwalk trail system can be accessed from trailheads located off of County Road 513. Just watch for the signs. Whichever route you choose, hiking the trails to these falls will be rewarding:

Rainbow Falls – A 1/2-mile hiking trail will take you from a paved parking lot to a stairway dropping down to an observation platform overlooking the scenic Black River and Rainbow Falls. Aptly named, the falling water creates a mist that can sometimes produce a rainbow effect. Just imagine the beautiful images you will be able to capture!

Sandstone Falls - While Sandstone Falls is not a large waterfall,



the varied rock formations and hollows carved out of sandstone and conglomerate rock by stream erosion make this little falls well worth the 1/4-mile hike.

Potawatomi and Gorge Falls -There are a few different routes to these falls. A 600 foot trail from the Potawatomi Falls parking lot will take you to the Potawatomi Falls viewing platform, where you can also walk along the trail as you view the river and falls. Gorge Falls is only a short distance north of Potawatomi Falls. A 500 foot asphalt surface trail, located at the south end of the Gorge Falls parking area, will also connect you to Potawatomi Falls viewing platform; this trail, vault toilet, and viewing platform are accessible, providing a unique opportunity for all to view one of our areas most beautiful waterfalls. A 400 foot trail to Gorge Falls is located at the north end of the Gorge Falls parking lot.

Great Conglomerate Falls - This 3/4-mile hiking trail will drop steadily as you near the riverbank. At the falls, the river separates into two sections, falling 40 feet around an island of conglomerate rock. Old growth hemlock and hardwood add to the natural beauty of the area. Gorge and Potawatomi Falls can also be reached from Great Conglomerate Falls, by hiking north approximately 1/3-mile, via the North Country National Scenic Trail.

Welcome Snowmobilers

Michigan's Western Upper Peninsula offers a variety of snowmobiling opportunities. In order to protect resources, the rights of others and to provide for your pleasure and safety, a variety of Local, State and Federal laws and regulations have been adopted. Some of the subject they address include:

Travel on Roads

In general snowmobiles may not be operated on a public highway or street. You may however, operate your snowmobile:

- On the unplowed right-of-way of a public highway except a limited access highway. The snowmobile must be operated with the flow of traffic.
- On the roadway or shoulder when necessary to cross a bridge or culvert.
- Across a public highway, other than a limited access highway, at right angles for the purpose of getting from one area to another.
- On the shoulder of a county road only when no right-of-way exists on all snowplowed roads in the Gogebic County Road system which are outside of the incorporated city or village, which is designated and marked for snowmobile use by the county roadsystem having jurisdiction. EXCEPTIONS WILL BE BOSTED.
- On unplowed Forest Service roads within the Ottawa National Forest. Exceptions to this rule will be posted.

Other Areas of Operation

A person may not operate a snowmobile

- · On a railroad right-of-way
- In or across a cemetery or burial groundOn land used as a public highway or street
- On National Forest lands, roads, or trails when
- there is less than 4 inches of snow on the ground
 On National Forest trails that have been designated for non-motorized uses such as skiing and hiking.

Trespass

About forty percent of the land within the Ottawa National Forest is privately owned. The following rules apply to these and all other private land in Michigan:

- A person shall not operate a snowmobile in or upon a private property without consent of the landowners.
- The Recreational Trespass Act requires written consent from the owner, his agent, or lessee before operating a snowmobile on lands which are:
- Fenced or enclosed and maintained in a manner to exclude entry.
- · Posted in a conspicuous manner against intruders.
- · Farmlands or connected wood lots


